

## From the Mayor .

- The School Bus Stopping Law: When a school bus is preparing to stop, you will see flashing yellow lights. When the bus stops with its red lights flashing and its stop arm extended, you must stop at least 10 feet away from the bus whether you are behind it, coming toward it on the same roadway or approaching an intersection where the bus is stopped. You must remain stopped until the red lights stop flashing, the stop arm has been withdrawn and the children have reached a safe place. The only exception to the school bus stopping requirement is if you are approaching a school bus that is stopped with its red lights flashing and stop arm extended and you are driving on the opposite side of a divided highway, you do not have to stop. You should reduce your speed and continue driving with caution. A good rule to follow is ,"When in doubt, STOP!" If you are convicted of violating the school bus stopping law you will receive a 60 day suspension of your license, five points on your driving record and a \$250 fine.
- PA's Law of Love: All driver's are responsible for securing children in appropriate restraint systems. For more information call 1-800-CAR BELT
- •Children younger than 2 must be secured in a rear-facing car seat until they outgrow the maximum height and weight limits of the car seat. All children 4 years of age and older, but less than 8 years of age, must be secured in a seat belt system and an appropriate belt-positioning booster seat anywhere in the vehicle. Violators are subject to a \$75 fine plus court costs, EMS, surcharges and administrative fees.
- •All children 8 years of age and older, but less than 18 years of age, must be secured in a seat belt system anywhere in the vehicle. Violators are subject to a \$10 fine plus EMS, surcharges and administration fees.
- So many of us enjoy feeding the birds, especially in the colder months when their food is scarce. Unfortunately, bird seed can also attract unwanted visitors, such as rats. So if you're feeding the birds, don't just throw the seed or bread in your yard. This practice is a violation of local ant-litter laws and county health regulations. Instead place the feed in an enclosed birdfeeder made specifically for this purpose. Also clean up under the feeder weekly. And if you know that rats are around, stop feeding the birds until the rat problem is solved.

## **Code Enforcement**

Reminders!

- Garbage must be in bags and then placed in proper cans with lids and MUST not be put out before 6 p.m. Wednesday or 6 p.m. the day before pick-up if garbage is delayed due to a holiday. Garbage that is not put out properly attracts rats, raccoons, and other unwelcomed critters.
- Winter is coming and that means snow. Property owners or tenants are required by ordinance to remove snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours from the end of a snowfall and should clear all sidewalks at a width of at least 24 inches. Also, do not push snow back out onto the street once the street has been plowed.

pwc3523@gmail.com or calling 412-523-8413. Tickets will also be available at the door. Proceeds from the event will support the club's scholarship fund.




**Church** Pitcairn Assembly of God Church, 520 Wall Avenue, has Sunday school at 9:45.m. and morning worship at 10:45 a.m.
