A Message from the Mayor & the Chief of Police Ordinance 856 that deals with solid waste, including but not limited to, municipal, residential or hazardous wastes, including solids, liquid, semi solid or contained gaseous material, states that it is unlawful for any person to throw, place, deposit or cause or permit to be thrown, placed or deposited any solid waste in or upon any street, alley, sidewalk, body of water, public or private property within the Borough except as provided in the ordinance. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of the ordinance, upon conviction, will be fined not less than \$100 or more than \$1000 and if the fine and costs are not paid, a term of imprisonment not to exceed 30 days will be applied.

Remember too, "If you see something, say something". Even though it may seem insignificant to you,
it may be helpful to the police and borough as a whole.
