

Notes From Our School Board Hello once again Pitcairn. By the time you read this spring, sweet glorious spring, will be upon us and as the saying goes a boys thoughts turn to baseball. The originator of that saying did not even bother to guess what girls thoughts might turn to in spring but here on the Gateway school board, our thoughts whether it is spring, winter or fall, are almost always on security. For the vast majority of you reading this, when you thought of security in school you most likely thought about the likelihood of someone swiping, that banana flip cake that your mom might have packed for lunch. Security now means strictly controlled entry points into schools, fully staffed school police departments and if you are fortunate enough to be part of the Gateway School District, a pilot program for both metal detectors and believe it or not, artificial intelligence. Gateway, in conjunction with folks originally from CMU, is the first school district in the area to utilize artificial intelligence to monitor our existing camera systems to detect threats before they can become more than just threats. Computers will be trained to recognize suspicious people and actions seen by our already in place cameras and instantly alert security. To attempt to provide the same level of security without artificial intelligence would require a human being to actually monitor each individual camera all day long which would be extraordinarily expensive. So, in this case artificial intelligence is not replacing human beings, it is augmenting them. It should go without saying that none of us ever imagined a world where this level of sophistication and technology would be necessary to keep our children, teachers and staff safe at school, but this is indeed where we find ourselves here in the spring of 2019. You should be at least somewhat comforted to know that the school district is using every tool available, and some just emerging, to battle this scourge. There is no perfect solution to this problem short of getting into the minds and souls of the maniacs intent on doing harm and stopping them before they are able. And statistically, the chances of anything happening at Gateway are minuscule but until the technology or magic is created to eliminate threats before they appear, we will do everything possible to keep our Gateway folks safe.


