Notes from Code Enforcement Winter is here! Even though it has been said before, remember that there is an ordinance that states that property owners or tenants are required to remove snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours from the end of a snowfall and should clear all sidewalks at a width of at least 24 inches. Also once your street has been plowed, do not push snow back into the street.

Just a reminder. Garbage should be placed in bags in a garbage can or covered container and • should not be put out before 6 p.m. the evening before pick up.

Meals St. Paul's Meals on Wheels, a program of PitCare, has been serving the community for over 40 years by providing meals to seniors and those who cannot prepare meals for themselves. All meals are prepared from scratch and clients receive one hot and one cold meal per day, Monday through Friday. The meals are delivered daily between 10 a.m. and Noon.

Clients can opt for delivery one to five days per week and the meals can easily be reheated in a microwave. St. Paul's received a low income grant from the Pittsburgh Foundation that allows their clients who meet the guidelines, to pay only \$3 a day for the meals. Also because of the pandemic, any Allegheny County resident over 18 years of age who has been negatively affected by COVID-19 can receive meals. Organization The following letter was submitted by the Pitcairn Community Renaissance organization: We can't speak for anyone else, but we are glad that 2020 is almost over and people can start to get back to normal. We would like to thank everyone who supported us in 2020, and also for the last 13 years that we have been involved in the community. For those who are not familiar with our organization, and even those who are, we would like to list some of the things we accomplished, with your help: Our first project, to help clean up some of the neighborhood and to make things a little brighter, we turned a weed filled corner lot on Wall Avenue into the Pitcairn Memory Garden. Each year, as much as possible, we had the kids from Pitcairn Elementary School, and then later from Propel Pitcairn help us plant flowers. We also planted flowers at the Park Building, the Lions Club memorial garden, and sometimes even Sugar Camp. All of the flowers were donated to us by the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, and we thank them for their support. We also painted old tires, in a wide variety of patterns and colors and gave them away to the people in the community to plant their own flowers. For our interest in the safety of our residence, we were very instrumental in obtaining surveillance cameras for several locations within the community. When Chief Farally became Chief, he jump started the program and bought many more cameras. Another well received project was replacing damaged sidewalks for some of our senior homeowners. We also started replacing some of the sidewalks on Broadway. We also had the privilege of working with the Merle and Olive Lee Gilliand Foundation. They were a huge help in making the new Borough building a reality. Speaking of the Borough building, we were among the many people who kept pushing to get cameras in the Council Chambers so that the people can watch the meetings from home. We are also involved with the Mon Valley Initiative, (MVI), trying to do something with housing in the community. But sadly, at the end of 2020, Doug and Virginia have decided to retire. And everyone, feeling that we have accomplished most of our goals, have voted to disband our group. So, as of December 31, 2020, we will be no more, but as for what we were trying to do with housing can still continue. MVI is still willing to work with Council, and we have two foundations in the community that may be willing to work with Council if Council can come up with a plan and an estimated cost of what they would like to accomplish in our community. So, thank you again for all the support that you have given us over the years.

Editor's Note: Pitcairn Renaissance has done many improvement projects in the community. Their disbanding will be a loss . Thank you for everyone who volunteered with the group and for all the projects you accomplished.


