District reports that as of this date, there are 94% more students attending our schools.

- Reminder: the penalty for passing a stopped school bus is:
 - 1. a \$250 fine plus court costs
 - 2. 60 day driver's license suspension
 - 3. 5 points on your driver's record



Notes from Code Enforcement October is Fire Prevention month. Make sure that your house or apartment has working smoke and carbon dioxide detectors.

• Keep porches and entry ways clear of debris for emergency personnel. .

• Remember that property owners or tenants are required by ordinance to remove snow and ice from sidewalks within 24 hours from the end of a snowfall and should clear all sidewalks at a width of at least 24 inches. Also, do not push snow back out onto the street once it has been plowed

Phil's Pharmacy, a staple of downtown Pitcairn, PA since November 1, 1968, closed the doors on August 6, 2021. Many will miss the ease of obtaining prescriptions at 426 Broadway. Kids and adults will miss the slurping of a sweet sticky slushies on a hot summer's day. Gone are the penny candies, inexpensive toiletry items, and fabulous finds like the Pittsburgh Steelers, Pirates, and Penguin's t-shirts. What will be missed more than all the sundry items in the brick-and -mortar store front is the contagious laughter of Phil and the staff bantering with customers. To know Phil, and all the various staff members over the 52+ years, is to know family. Phillip R. Arlia began his working career at the age of 11, earning a dollar a week. Eighty years later Phil has finally retired. Phil attended Duquesne University, graduating in 1959 with a bachelor's degree in Pharmaceutical Sciences. After working for a couple years with Thrift Drugs and Rite Aid, Phil made the bold move to purchase Ken's Pharmacy. Over the years Phil would see generations of families come and go – attending graduations, weddings, and funerals. Phil's Pharmacy was a hub for many seeking a happy place. Phil deeply appreciates how those of Pitcairn embraced him and his family, as well as the pharmacy staff. Loyalty and love made the years go by in a blur.

Editor's Note: It didn't matter if you were a regular customer who got prescriptions filled or a casual customer who purchased cards, candy or other items from the drugstore. Phil was a friend to everyone in the community. He supported many organization fundraisers and also had a kind word for anyone entering his store. You are missed Phil.
