Whether you are riding a bike, a skate board or using skates, please remember to dress to be seen The State law save that any person under the age of 12, riding a bicycle or i and always wear a helmet. The State law says that any person under the age of 12, riding a bicycle or if you are a passenger, must wear a helmet. Always ride in the direction of traffic if on the road; stop at stop signs and traffic lights and obey all traffic laws. Also consider riding on a designation bike trail instead of on the streets. When bicycling use both hands while riding and braking and for your own safety, lock up your bike when not in use.

Remember that you must schedule a pick-up for electronics and small appliances, such as televisions, toasters etc. These items should not be put out for regular garbage pick-up. You must call 1-800-449-7587 to arrange for a free pick-up. More detailed information can be found on the Borough website.


Meals on Wheels The Pitcairn Meals-on-Wheels is looking for volunteers to


**Banquet** The Pitcairn Lions Club and the Pitcairn Woman's Club held a banquet in May at the Park Building to honor stu-
