A Message from the Mayor & the Chief of Police A reminder for your child's safety, PA state law mandates that children and young adults up to 18 years of age must be restrained in an appropriate car seat or seat belt depending on their age, weight and height. Failure to do so could result in a \$75 fine plus court costs. Below are guidelines for car seats: Read and follow the car seat and vehicle owner's manuals for installing and using seats Infants must ride rear-facing until age 2 or until maximum weight or height allowed by the car seat's manufacturer •Never place a rear-facing car seat in the front seat of vehicle with an active passenger side air bag •Children younger than age 13 should ride in the back seat •Children who have outgrown the rear facing car seat should be secured in a forward facing car seat with a harness for as long as possible •Place the car seat harness through the correct slots/at or below the shoulder for rear facing; at or above the shoulders for forward facing •The car seat harness should not allow any slack •Place the vehicle seat belt through the correct belt path •Tighten and LOCK the seat belt according to directions in the vehicle owner's manual •Children who have outgrown their front facing car seat should be properly secured in a booster seat until the lap and shoulder belts fit correctly at between 8 and 12 years of age. Did you know Pitcairn has Ordinances that govern the use of your property? Each year Pitcairn receives hundreds of calls from citizens with property maintenance concerns. In response to these inquiries, Code Enforcement has prepared this list to make sure your property is compliant. ***Being a Good Neighbor:** We all want to live in a strong and safe community. By sharing your time, talent and resources, you are making Pitcairn a desirable place to live, work, raise a family and feel safe. Use the information below to involve your family, neighbors and friends in the process of educating them with tips, suggestions and reminders of what it takes to be a good neighbor.

•Keep your home properly identified for emergency situations. House numbers on front and back. •Keep your yard groomed on a regular basis

•Keep sidewalks free from obstructions such as bushes growing into the sidewalk path, tree limbs hanging lower than seven feet and cars parked on the sidewalk.

- •Don't let weeds or grassy areas exceed six inches in height.
- •Clean up after your pets.
- •Keep noise level to a minimum.
- •Park vehicles on the street or in your driveway, not on the sidewalk or lawn.

•Dispose of excess trash and debris. Garbage can be put out at 6 p.m. Wednesday evening. Garbage should be in bags then placed in trash cans with a lid.

- •Retrieve garbage cans by midnight on Thursday.
- •Prevent standing water which attracts and breeds mosquitoes.
- •Order a Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) pick-up from Waste Management

(www.WMAtYourDoor.com) (1-800-449-7587) for car batteries, TV sets, computers, VCRS, oil. •It's easy to spread good will by offering to help a neighbor do the same. Something as simple as bringing in the garbage can for an elderly or sick neighbor is an expression of good will. Reaching out to those close to you can be a benefit to the whole block!
